

The Big Takeaways:

- 1. Historians generally do not touch on the fact that America has put natives through genocide.
 - 1. If History is often written from the perspective of the "winners," or those who have prevailed.
- 2. The United States government was built by wealthy landowners for themselves and that tradition continues today.
 - 1. Much of the constitution consists of protecting landowners and does not even mention those other

than wealthy, white men.

- 3. Women were treated horribly in the early days of America, but eventually began to rally.
 - 1. Post Revolution, women began learning how to read and write, and doubled their literacy rate to 80% within a few decades.
- 4. The Civil War was fought to maintain the status of the country, not to end slavery.
 - Former slave owners were compensated for the loss of slaves, while former slaves were left to fend for themselves.
- 5. Rather than liberating the oppressed, the American government answered the civil rights movement with suppression.
 - Laws that were eventually passed still discriminated against minorities, specifically African Americans.
